I. Policy

Highway construction is a major component of the national infrastructure. The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) is responsible for providing financial assistance to the States for the construction, reconstruction, and maintenance of the public highway system. The FHWA's primary mission is to ensure that the highway system is safe, efficient, and sustainable. This is achieved through a combination of funding, technical assistance, and regulatory oversight.
