Effective Practices for Program Revision and Development

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What is a Program?

"An organized sequence of courses leading to a defined objective, a degree, a certificate, a diploma, a license, or transfer to another institution of higher education." (title 5 §55000)

Types

- Associate Degree (local)
 - AS (STEM and CTE)
 - AA (All others)
- Associate Degree for Transfer
 - AA-T
 - AS-T
- Certificate of Achievement
- Certificate of Completion or Competency
 - Noncredit only

Transcripted Programs

- Associate Degrees
 - AA, AS (locally defined)
 - AA-T, AS-T (externally defined)
- Certificates of Achievement
 - 12-17.99 units, approved by CCCCO*
 - 18 or more units, approved by CCCCO

Where do I start?

- Program Outcomes
- What will students be able to do when they complete the program?
- All courses should support the outcomes
- Minimum number of courses that achieve outcomes

Example of Program Goals (Outcomes)

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Bilingual Elementary Teacher Assistant/Special Education Certificate of Achievement

Students who complete will be prepared to:

- 3. continue to towards the Elementary Teacher AA-T degree completion.
- 4. take the Bilingual Paraeducator exam.

What courses?

 Courses with SLOs that support those outcomes should be included in the certificate

 What is the minimum list of courses that support those outcomes?

Who's at the Table?

- Other faculty in discipline
- Faculty in affected disciplines
- Articulation Officer (transfer goals)
- Advisory Committees (CTE)
- Curriculum Committee and support staff
- Area Dean
- AP4021 process if NEW Program

Outside Influences

- For CTE
 - Advisory Committee
 - Labor Market data
 - Regional Consortium (BACCC)
 - c-id.net model curricula and transfer model curricula
- For transfer
 - c-id.net model curricula and transfer model curricula

Degree Standards from Title 5

- At least 18 semester units defining a major or area of emphasis
 - These courses aligned with TOP code identified for the degree
- At least 18 semester units of GE (locally determined according to regulations—21 for HC)
- At least 60 total semester units

Degree Standards from Title 5

- Writing competency
 - C or better in English course at Freshman Comp level or higher (also counts for Composition GE

Degree Standards from Title 5

- Math competency
 - C or better in Intermediate Algebra (or course with same rigor and Elementary Algebra as prereq)
 - Or score on exam comparable to completion of the course
 - At Hartnell this is MAT 123

Certificates of Achievement (CoA)

- "Well-defined pattern of learning experiences designed to develop capabilities oriented to career or GE."
- If 18 or more units, MUST submit to CCCCO
- If 12-17.99 units MAY submit to CCCCO
 - If not submitted, then CANNOT be called Certificate of Achievement and NOT transcripted.
 - Also can't be called Cert of Completion or Competence (these are for noncredit)

Additional Hartnell Requirement for Certificate of Achievement

Certificate Units set to Change

- Proposal for 8+ unit CoAs to be eligible for CCCCO approval.
- 16 or more units means CoA is eligible for financial aid
 - Important consideration if you are interested in offering certificate with fewer than 16 units. Be Careful for your students!

 Courses in degree contribute to Program Learning Outcomes.

 Consistent with similar degrees at other colleges.

Duplication of degrees?

- Courses in degree are at the lower-division level.
- Courses in degree are degree-applicable and meet the standards for a degree-applicable course.
 - 1-199 level, critical thinking, writing, problem solving, application, independent learning, college level rigor and vocabulary

 Courses in degree are active and the college is committed to offering the courses at least on a two-year cycle.

This should include restricted electives. Too many choices makes it difficult to have good enrollments and offer regularly.

- Has appropriate number of required major units.
- Has appropriate number of restricted electives and choices.
- Required major courses contribute to core body of knowledge in the field.
- Restricted electives add to the body of knowledge and advance student ability while still at the lower division level

Special Considerations for CTE

- Courses in degree/certificate lead to job opportunities
- If students are "jobbing out" after a few courses, might this be your "core"?
- Consider groups of restricted electives that will guide students in their selections.
